Biblical Hebrew 4 (CRST 332)

Syllabus Spring 2023 (preliminary)

Course descriptions

Applying principles of grammar, semantics and syntax to the translation and interpretation of Biblical Hebrew (i.e., the original language in which the Old Testament of the Bible was written). This course seeks to help students to read, translate and interpret the ancient Hebrew Old Testament.

Assessments

Attendance

After a student's second absence, each further absence reduces the *attendance grade* proportionally unless it is unavoidable due to serious illness or bereavement. It is the students' responsibility to communicate with the professor about missed class periods. According to university policy, students who attend less than 67 percent of class periods will not be permitted to take the final exam.


Workbooks

Students will complete four workbooks over the course of the semester. Due dates are mentioned in the schedule below.

Learning Reports

Students should practice Hebrew regularly on their own. Recommended learning activities include practicing vocabulary and studying *Aleph with Beth* lessons (on YouTube). Students should report how they have been learning via the online form linked on Moodle.

The grade for learning activities is based on a point system: Points are earned for the activities mentioned in each learning report. At the end of the semester, the total number of points is converted to a percentage grade according to the graph below. Grades above 100 percent (i.e., extra credit) are possible by earning more than 500 points in learning activities.



Ouizzes

Quizzes will focus on vocabulary, grammar, and translation.

Hebrew Capstone Project

A major focus of the fourth semester of Hebrew is on the completion of the Capstone Project, which is a culmination of each student's study and demonstrates the competency gained over the past two years. The Capstone Project has two parts, corresponding to the two fourth-semester Hebrew courses. Part 1 (language) belongs to this course, CRST 332, whereas part 2 (literature) belongs to CRST 421.

For the language part of the capstone project, students will compose a narration for a short video (about 3–4 minutes). Preliminary drafts of this assignment should be completed by the due dates specified in the syllabus, which will be graded and returned to the students for corrections and refinement. The grade of the final draft will replace the grades of preliminary drafts. Moreover, students will present their projects orally to the class.

Final Exam

The final exam has two parts, corresponding to the two fourth-semester Hebrew courses. The written part of the exam belongs to CRST 332 and focuses on grammar and translation. The oral part of the exam belongs to CRST 421 and focuses on reading, analysis, and interpretation of a text from Genesis.
